Russia Field Report February 2017

Well, we've been praying that God would peak people's interest in Russia and the news outlets have certainly been helping with that. As we visit schools and churches everyone asks similar questions about Russia. Is it still open to missionary work? Will local events change anything for your work there? And so on. We don't expect much to change for InterAct's ministry in Russia. Unless you're a politician in Russia, politics exist on a different reality than everyday life. We sense, and from others opinions as well, that when missionaries operate in Russia and attempt to bring those two areas of life together, they increase their chances of government interference in their work. After the new "antimissionary" law was passed, there were stories that in some regions of Russia the local FSB called local pastors together and told them straight-up, "If you don't say anything about politics, you won't have any problems under the new law."

Looking through the list of people who have been fined under the new law, there are two commonalities. One is that they have broken another Russian law and the "anti-missionary" law was tacked on as a way to more easily fine the law-breaker. It ranges from short-term missionaries breaking visa laws to Buddhist monks using narcotics in their religious ceremonies. The second similarity is using aggressive public evangelism. Many of these fines for public evangelism were overturned because sharing one's personal beliefs is protected under the Russian Constitution; however, this type of evangelism has been looked down on for a long time and has been mostly ineffective since the mid-90's

Perspective

Two of most often prayed requests for our Special Assignment to the U.S. this Winter were that God would guide us to connect with people with a heart's burden for Russia and that God would help us understand the younger generation in college know and what drives their passion for missions.

Our time on college campuses was fruitful. We have two EnGage! Russia applications in from people looking toward long-term ministry and are awaiting a third. And our interactions have shown us that although Millennials may see the world through a different lessened certainly have been raised in a world different that we were, the passion for Christ has not diminished.

As we continue with our vision for a team in Krasnoyarsk and a team in an unreached town, we know the first step toward accomplishing that goal is recruitment. This was the primary focus of Special Assignment and needs to continue as we return to the field in March.

Namely that Yakutia's isolated villages remain largely unreached and that a knowledge of the Sakha language is imparative
